Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: Renaissance Global Markets Fund (the *Fund*) seeks to obtain long-term growth of capital and income by investing primarily in equity and debt securities on a worldwide basis.

Investment Strategies: The Fund invests in equity securities of companies located around the world that are priced below their intrinsic value, as determined by the portfolio sub-advisor. The Fund attempts to hold a portfolio that is diversified among different sectors and geographies using multiple risk factors in relation to perceived valuation attractiveness.

Risk

The Fund is a global equity fund that is suitable for long-term investors who can tolerate medium investment risk.

For the period ended August 31, 2020, the Fund's overall level of risk remains as discussed in the simplified prospectus

Results of Operations

Effective March 2, 2020, CIBC Asset Management Inc. (*CAMI*, the *Manager* or *Portfolio Advisor*) assumed portfolio management responsibilities for the Fund, replacing Causeway Capital Management LLC (*Causeway*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended August 31, 2020. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value decreased by 7% during the period, from \$84,489 as at August 31, 2019 to \$78,539 as at August 31, 2020. Net redemptions of \$16,167 were partially offset by positive investment performance, resulting in an overall decrease in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 13.1% for the period. The Fund's benchmark, the MSCI World Index (the *benchmark*), returned 15.1% for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

Earlier in the period, positive developments on U.S.-China trade talks provided a boost for global stocks. While the positive momentum of 2019 continued into the early weeks of January, growing concerns about the impact of COVID-19 led to global stocks retreating significantly, with cyclical stocks declining the most.

Central banks and governments worldwide implemented interest rate reductions and other monetary and fiscal stimulus measures, which provided strong support for equity markets. In Europe, the European Central Bank lowered its key interest rate and renewed quantitative easing. The U.S. Federal Reserve Board and the Bank of Canada also lowered interest rates significantly in an effort to support the economy and maintain liquidity in the markets.

Although many countries continued to be locked down in April 2020, the global economy began reopening in several countries beginning in May. This increased economic activity resulted in greater business and consumer spending, which added to optimism in the markets.

When the Fund was under Causeway's management, stock selection in Canada, France, China and Japan detracted from performance. A moderate underweight allocation to Canada and significant overweight exposure to China also detracted from performance, as did a significant overweight allocation to Germany.

In terms of industries, stock selection in the software and services, transportation and media and entertainment industry groups detracted from the Fund's performance. Moderate overweight allocations to software and services and transportation also detracted from performance, as did a moderate underweight exposure to media and entertainment. Other detractors from performance included a significant overweight allocation to the communication services sector and a moderate underweight allocation to the semiconductors and equipment industry group.

Individual detractors from performance included Sabre Corp. and Ovitiv Inc. Travel technology company Sabre was affected by weaker demand for travel in the wake of COVID-19. Oil exploration and

production company Ovintiv was also affected by COVID-19 concerns that pressured oil prices.

Causeway's stock selection and significant overweight allocations to South Korea and the U.K. contributed to the Fund's performance. Moderate overweight exposures to Italy and Switzerland also contributed to performance, as did a significant underweight allocation to the U.S.

A significant overweight allocation to capital goods and moderate overweight exposure to banking contributed to performance in terms of industries. A slight overweight allocation to technology hardware and equipment contributed as well, as did a significant underweight allocation to retailing and a moderate underweight exposure to the food, beverage and tobacco industry group contributed to performance.

Individual contributors to the Fund's performance included SYNEX Corp., Samsung Electronics Co. Ltd. and Barclays PLC. SYNEX performed well as cost efficiencies related to an acquisition were ahead of schedule. Samsung benefited from continued improvements in the outlook for memory pricing and 5G smartphone growth, while Barclays made strides in its restructuring program.

Causeway added Siemens AG to the Fund after the company announced plans to sell its power and gas unit to focus on digital industries and smart infrastructure. Air France-KLM was purchased for its dominant market share in a high-yielding network. Exelon Corp. was purchased for its strong free cash flow.

Bank of America Corp. and Flowserve Corp. were eliminated from the Fund after strong performance. A holding in East Japan Railway Co. was exited after its shares had performed well. KDDI Corp. and UniCredit SPA were trimmed after strong share price performance. A holding in Prudential PLC was reduced amid a decline in its Asian business.

After CAMI assumed management of the Fund, a slight overweight allocation to the real estate sector and a slight underweight allocation to the information technology sector detracted from performance. Stock selection in the information technology sector also detracted from performance. An underweight position in strong-performing Amazon.com Inc. detracted from performance, and a holding in United Rentals Inc. detracted from performance as a result of the company's high debt levels.

A slight underweight allocation to the health care sector was a contributor to the Fund's performance under CAMI's management. Stock selection in the energy and financials sectors also contributed to performance. Individual contributors to performance included Cintas Corp., as the uniform rental and office supplies company benefited when clients' employees began returning to work. Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co. Ltd. benefited from product delays by competitor Intel Corp. Adobe Inc. benefited from increased demand for its software.

Upon assuming management of the Fund, CAMI took the opportunity to improve the quality of holdings and participate in a pandemic recovery scenario. New holdings included Colgate-Palmolive Co. as it

has a resilient business. Cintas was added based on its opportunity to participate in the economic reopening. Allegion plc was added as its electronic locks business is in demand regardless of the environment. Increased positions included Ross Stores Inc. based on its strong competitive positioning.

Eliminated holdings included Shiseido Co. Ltd. given the negative impact of travel retail on its business. Nestlé SA was exited in favour of other companies in the consumer staples sector. The Boeing Co. was negatively impacted by lower demand for travel. Decreased holdings included Teleperformance, in order to control its weighting in the Fund after a period of strong performance.

The Fund's higher portfolio turnover rate for the period was due to the sub-advisor change described under "Recent Developments".

Recent Developments

Effective March 2, 2020, CAMI directly provided investment management services to the Fund, replacing Causeway.

Effective January 30, 2020, the annual management fee payable was reduced from 1.75% to 1.70% in respect of Class A units of the Fund, and from 0.75% to 0.70% in respect of Class F units of the Fund.

The composition of the Independent Review Committee (*IRC*) changed during the period. Don Hunter and Merle Kriss retired effective April 26, 2020. Effective April 27, 2020, David Forster and Deborah Leckman were appointed as members of the IRC. Marcia Lewis Brown was appointed Chair effective April 1, 2020.

The international spread of COVID-19 caused a significant slowdown in the global economy and volatility in financial markets. The COVID-19 outbreak may adversely affect global markets and the performance of the Fund.

Related Party Transactions

CIBC and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor of the Fund

CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's Manager, Trustee, and Portfolio Advisor. As Manager, CAMI receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in *Management Fees*. As Trustee, CAMI holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders. As Portfolio Advisor, CAMI provides, or arranges to provide for, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI also compensates dealers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CAMI may invest in units of the Fund.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CAMI's related dealers such as the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (*CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Service division of CIBC

ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (CIBC WM). CIBC ISI and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CAMI may pay sales commissions and trailing commissions to these dealers and firms in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these sales commissions and trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

CAMI generally delegates trading and execution authority to the portfolio sub-advisors and does not, in its capacity as portfolio advisor, receive any goods or services directly through soft dollar arrangements.

The Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisor to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities, other securities, and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the nature and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors when they process trades through them (referred to in the industry as “soft-dollar” arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisor with investment decision-making services for the Fund or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

In addition, the Manager may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$4,580 to CIBC WM; the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the IRC:

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (a *Related Dealer*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the exemptive relief order granted by the Canadian securities regulatory authorities and in accordance with the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity and debt securities from or sell them to a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a Related Dealer is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate of the Manager; and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units of the Fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred to or reported to it by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with conditions imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Fund (the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Fund are paid by CAMI and/or dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Fund during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (CIBC GSS) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending,

fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

Management Fees

The Fund pays CAMI an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CAMI in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisor are paid by CAMI out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CAMI. Refer to the simplified prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units.

For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended August 31, 2020. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.



Year-by-Year Returns



Class A Units


